50%	2 hrs 00 mins
70%	3 hrs 00 mins

90%	5 hrs 30 mins
99%	30 hrs 00 mins

Distance between places missing & found

Cumulative percentage of cases	Distance between locations missing and found (n=90)
30%	350 metres
50%	550 metres
70%	1.1 kilometres
80%	1.3 kilometres
90%	1.8 kilometres
99%	6.8 kilometres


#### TABLE 3:

Likely places children are found

Cumulative percentage of cases	Likely places found (n=90)
31%	Traced walking in public street/park
27%	Returned to their place of residence
21%	Went to relative's address
19%	Went to friend's address
3%	Traced at shops or community/leisure centre

#### THINGS TO CONSIDER:

- Children of this age are now at school, they are learning about new areas and begin to travel further afield
- They make new friends, check with school for class list parents are unlikely to know who they are associating with
- All of the children traced beyond the black circle were either 'parental abductions' or the result of misunderstandings between either parents or relatives as to who the child should be with
- Females of this age have a greater tendency to be traced at friend's home, males tend to be found hanging about the streets
- Within this sample, 79% were female and 21% male
- 69% went missing on foot, 11% on their bicycles
- 65% went missing from home, 20% from school
- 46% were found by police and 40% by relatives (includes those who return home)

# **SIPR Small Research Grant**

Analyse 12 months of CF / key case info

Directly support the aims of the SIPR Evidence & Investigation Network

The Scottish Institute for **Policing Research** 



### 6 months data entered....

663 cases in total – 274 CF (41% completion rate)

143 (45%) female cases / 131 (38%) male cases

Age – spread proportionate with population



### Adults...

# 18 yrs + = 148 cases – 65 CF (44% completion rate)

22 (49%) female cases / 43 (42%) male cases

Age – spread across 18 – 72 years



# Niggling questions...

Where do they go, do they know where they are going, does this influence how long are they away?



# Where?

54% knew where they intended going
83% went only to familiar places
Almost 40% on foot

62% stayed in same town / area
26% went to another town/place in same area
12% Went to another county / region





**Estimate furthest distance....** 

50% 8 miles75% 25 miles

10% more than 100 miles

### **Timescales - left to located**

- 40% 12 hours
- 60% 24 hours
- 80% 48 hours
- 43% were traced / 57% returned of own accord
- Figures much the same for timescales in relation to above two groups

# Niggling questions...

### Why do people go missing & why do some return of their own accord?



# Why?

- Problems with family relationships (19%)
- Problems with work / Losing job (6%)
- Recent bereavement (2%)
- Illness / addiction problems (6%)
- Financial problems (2%)
- Multiple factors (17%)
- Lost...
- Miscommunication...
- Little evidence of religious beliefs / faith



# Why?

Why did you decide to come back?

"Gained courage" "Intended to" "In response to police message" "I had been away long enough" "Aware people would be concerned" "No longer felt suicidal"





Is there anything which would have made you return sooner?

*"If I had known I'd been reported missing" "Less guilt / more confidence" "If I'd realised how long I'd been away"* 





If you had not been traced, would you have returned of your own accord eventually?

Yes = 59% / No = 21% / Not sure = 21%

How long before you would have returned? "Don't know..." "Soon" "Couple of hours" "Maybe I wouldn't ever"



# **Niggling questions...**

# What happens to them while they are missing?



# What?

31% were accompanied at some point

- 23% accompanied all the time
- 31% accompanied by friends
- 3% strangers

Lot of 'just walking / walking about'
Drinking (drugs) features significantly (21%+)
17% say they avoided police contact



# What?

#### Mental health.....

- 50% clinically diagnosed
- 60% general diagnosis



- More than a quarter depressed
- Psychosis / schizophrenia / learning difficulties / dementia / addiction problems...



# What?

### Vulnerabilities...

- 3% reported someone encourages them to take part in criminal activity
- 10% reported feeling vulnerable or in danger while away
- 12% sustained injuries
- 34% worried about coming back



#### Are we dealing with a missing adult...



23% considered taking their own life

But only 4% spoke about it

10% reported actually trying to take their life

#### .....or a potential suicide?

### **Good practice?**

Feedback highlights operational benefits of cancellation:

- Risk assessment
- Search Strategy
- Resource management
- Successful outcome
- Referral...



### Management benefits...

Informs policy log

Provides an evidence base

More defensible actions / decisions

Finish entering data over the coming months...more advanced analysis
